FROM FATHER IAN:

Being Missional – and what it means for us!

What the heck does "Missional" mean? Bishop Douglas (The Bishop of Connecticut) has used the word "missional" in communications, talks and sermons for many years.

The Latin word Missio means "I send" from it we get the word "mission" what we are sent to do. The Missio Dei "The Mission of God" is what God is doing and sends us to do with Him. The mission of God, broadly and simply put is to Restore all Creation. To what? To that perfect (complete) state of unity with God that is described in the first verses of the Book of Genesis – before the "Fall" – Adam. Eve. Apple. Serpent. Goodbye Eden. Sin, murder, flood, death, exile....you get the picture.

As Christians we believe that all can be restored through the saving power of God incarnate, Jesus Christ, who lived and died and rose again so that all might live and live eternally.

Attractional – v – Missional approach to being the Church

Attractional – BAD. Our job locally is to discern our role in God's mission. The Vestry and a few others, this summer, worked with Alan Roxburgh's book "Joining God, Remaking Church, Changing the World". In the first part of this very good book, he notes that all churches have declined in membership by massive numbers since about 1960. The Episcopal Church is one third to one half the size it once was here in America. The other thing he notes is that during that time the response of church leaders has been, if I can borrow some secular terms, simply to re-package the same old product and re-brand it and give it newer cooler slogans and jingles and logos and hope this will attract more people.

During this same time period we experienced a period of decline at Christ Church that was in excess of the national average. The "Attractional Church" acts in what I would call the "Field of Dreams" approach – "If I build it they will come." In other words, "If I have a great event or organist or website or sign....more people will come and want to help us pay the light bill and fix the boiler." It hasn't happened in 20 years – 40 years really – and it won't happen next year! That's the bad news.

Missional – GOOD. The good news is that we know what doesn't work, so we start by changing our approach, which gives us time and energy to do new things.

The missional approach is not to "keep it together" and "struggle to do what we have always done" The missional approach is to unload our baggage (reference last Sunday's sermon about the camel needing to be unloaded to pass through the narrow gate into the City of Jerusalem just as we do to enter the Kingdom of God) as a congregation to give us the space and time and energy to try new things allowing us to discern, adjust and try again.

Within the missional approach, we begin to identify where God is already at work in the community and join him there. Rather than inviting people to do things with us here, we join them where they are. In essence, rather than leading a horse to water, we join the horse where he is on his journey and begin to build relationship. Then, after relationships have been established, we do things together either here OR there.

An example of this approach at work is found in the "She Mattered" event we hosted last month. Joyce Generoso was looking for where God was at work in the Community. She read an article in the Norwalk Hour about a program dealing with bullying and suicide among young teens. She contacted the woman running the program and began a conversation. We met with her and with local mental health professionals to discern the need for the message to be spread. Next, we invited her onto campus along with folks from the community and local

churches and 20 people attended a seminar where God was at work within our community.

Later this month and next month you will hear more about a major new missional initiative that the Mission Team is currently exploring for feasibility, and will be presenting to the Vestry. It will be will be a major extension of our campus into the community, and we will be seeking funding in 2020 through both grants and donations. It is in response to where YOU have said you have seen God at work in the neighborhood and where you have felt God's love flowing through you while here at Christ Church and taking the best of what has revitalized a church in the neighborhood and bringing it here.

Her parents were long-time friends with Evelyne and Wally Bates who were also parishioners of Christ Church and Nancy sees them regularly when she vacations in Jupiter where they make their permanent home.

When I asked Nancy what keeps her at Christ Church, she didn't hesitate to give me the answer: "it's my family". She enjoys the close relationships she has made in her time here and being a part of all the activities hosted over the years at Christ Church. During her many years here, Nancy has been a nursery school teacher, the women's group President, part of the Altar Guild, and a long time Vestry member. MISSION TEAM:

The Mission Team hosted the "She Mattered" event on October 23, 2019 to discuss and explore the areas of bullying and suicide. Deborah Berman shared her experiences and knowledge with the group on what can be done to help those who are struggling with these issues. It was a timely informative event with interactive learning for teens, parents and educators alike. There was strong input from the teens, and questions on addressing those issues for parents. I believe this event was a good way to bring us into the community, and that it will lead us to-

ward hosting other important albeit difficult topics going forward.

The Mission committee is currently working on the Wellness Fair scheduled for Saturday, April 18, 2020.

We are in the preliminary stages of figuring out how many vendors we can accommodate. Paul got clearance from Wells Fargo Bank to use their lot for parking and he discussed them being a sponsor for our event.

The next step is to contact the vendors and invite them. We have a whole list to choose from when Paul and I visited the Heath & Wellness Fair at Harbor Point Marina in Stamford a couple of months ago.

Once we have an idea of how many are committed we will report back how much we plan to make at the fair.

Additional we are exploring the possibility of hosting an "Education for Ministry" group here for our parishioners, and parishioners from our sister churches in Fairfield County. There will be more on this over the next couple of months as we define our intentions.
